Productivity and Priming Effects in Nominal and Verbal Patterns

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My research explores how the brain processes language, with a specific focus on the morphological structure of the Arabic mental lexicon. I investigate how productivity affects the processing of nominal and verbal patterns using masked and cross-modal priming experiments. The findings highlight the brain's sensitivity to morphological regularities and support dual-route models of lexical access.

Dissertation Title: The Phonetics and Phonology of So-Called Vowel Devoicing in Malagasy

Post-graduation plans: I returned to UCLA as a lecturer in phonology and will now begin my academic job search in Canada.

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My research centers on the phonetics and phonology of Malagasy, an Austronesian language spoken in Madagascar. In my dissertation, I look at a phenomenon called "vowel devoicing", where certain Malagasy vowels seem to not be pronounced, using acoustic evidence to argue that the vowels have not truly disappeared and modelling this result using a theory of gestural phonology. I also have a research programme investigating the intonational and prosodic properties of Malagasy, showing how Malagasy prosodic structure is linked to syntactic structure.

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In my dissertation, I looked at how different extralinguistic cognitive systems can influence early language learning and use. In one part of my dissertation, I looked at how preschoolers and adults perceive complex events as a way of understanding limitations that the visual working memory system may have on the acquisition of verbs that label such complex events; in the second part, I developed a computational parser examining how working memory and cognitive control can

influence early sentence processing individually and in tandem. Before that, I worked on quantifying phonetic variation in naturalistic infant-directed speech and conducting some follow-up experiments with infants based on those findings.
